All about Mission

The April Vestry meeting at St. Anne's was a time of reflection and forward thinking, focusing on developing our mission within the Dunbar community. We pondered the balance between offering support within the church's walls, and stepping out into the community to serve. A number of consultation events will take place over the summer and autumn to gain a broad range of ideas and views.

The Buildings Group reported on the status of the Halo lamp pilot and the ongoing review of the options and costs of repurposing the church. As these projects are being developed, they will form part of the Mission Consultation, helping to inform our consideration of the differing options available to us.

The Discipleship Group have been hard at work and planning several fellowship and Young Church events, including the return of soup lunches and Godly play sessions for Pentecost and this summer's Olympics.

Introduction to the New Testament Epistles - 1 Corinthians

A regular series by Stuart Ritchie

The letters to the Corinthians are rather special:

- They were written at an early date, around 55AD. They throw considerable light on the Christian movement prior to the writing of any Gospel.
- Paul's statements concerning the resurrection of Jesus and the institution of the Lord's Supper constitute the earliest preserved record of these events.


3.The problems discussed in 1 Corinthians give us insights into life at that time.

Paul was very familiar with the Corinthian Church and its members. After spending 18 months there, he had moved on to Ephesus. However, just before setting off again from Ephesus, he received a disturbing report of quarrelling and deep divisions within the Church in Corinth. An immediate response was required.

So, 1 Corinthians contains a frank discussion of a range of issues within the Church. Paul's letter provided an important early model for how the Church should handle congregational problems. Rather than ignore divisions and various social, moral and religious issues, Paul addresses the problems head on. Indeed, he makes it clear that he is willing to risk the good opinion of some, in order to sort out problems that seriously threatened the Church.

Paul addresses queries relating to life as a Christian. He tackles issues of doctrine. For example, the Corinthians had numerous questions about the celebration of the Lord's Supper and appropriate forms of worship. Today's Episcopalians, Methodists and Presbyterians - *inter alia* - will feel quite at home when reading about liturgical divisions and quarrels within the Church!

Eco Planters

You may have noticed a recent, very stylish addition to the left of the pulpit: three copper-finished aluminium planters, which have been planted with a variety of shade-loving plants, seeds and bulbs. These are in place of weekly flower arrangements: since a huge percentage of bought flowers have to be air-freighted into the UK, in-line with St Anne's' work towards Net Zero we are looking to reduce our carbon footprint in all sorts of ways.


One of the members of the flower team had seen a similar concept in a church she had visited on holiday and the idea was approved by Vestry several years ago, but only recently were we able to apply for a grant from East Lothian Climate Action Network (ELCAN) for this.

Judy Dale and Gill Harley used the grant to purchase the beautiful planters, and there was sufficient money to locally purchase shade-loving plants, seeds and bulbs and - most importantly - peat-free compost. They aim to make seasonal changes in the contents of the planters. Some of St. Anne's children, their parents and grandparents, worked











with Gill to sow seeds and plant bulbs in small pots, which the children will later transplant into the planters. Gill is also working with the Harbour Lights group, planting and sowing seeds and bulbs, teaching them about growing conditions, maintenance and peat-free compost.

Fresh flowers will still be used on special occasions.

Opportunities to Volunteer with L'Arche UK

Might you or someone you know be called to explore working with L'Arche UK? L'Arche is a movement of life-sharing communities where people with and without learning disabilities live together on a mission to build a world where everyone belongs, helping each other live full and empowered lives, enriched with belonging, kindness, creativity, fun and joy.

Having reflected on their current circumstances and the needs of those who live and work with them, L'Arche, are piloting two internships, both starting in September 2024.

Soulful Internship

A one-year internship in a L'Arche Community - Edinburgh, Canterbury or Manchester. This is for those who want to spend time in community, deepening their spiritual life and journey, as well as engaging in the daily rhythm of life in L'Arche. It is particularly suited to those wanting to spend time in discernment of vocation, whatever that vocation may be. This may be at any age or stage of life, and is open to those of any faith or who are 'spiritual but not religious'. There is a requirement to have a right to work in the UK but no residency limits, so it is open to refugees and asylum seekers, regardless of length of time in the UK.

Care Apprenticeship

A two-year internship in a L'Arche Community - Bognor, Brecon, Ipswich, Canterbury or Inverness. This is for those who want to spend time in community, engaging in the daily rhythm of life in

L'Arche, whilst gaining qualifications in health and social care, making it particularly suited to those wanting work in this sector, whether they stay with L'Arche after two years or move on. This may be at any age or stage of life, and is suitable for people of any faith or none. There is a requirement to have a right to work in the UK and to have lived here for two years; it is open refugees and asylum seekers, if they have been in the UK long enough.

Application process

The application process is, at its heart, one of discernment, both for the applicant and for L'Arche. Potential applicants are welcome to get in touch with Mary Osborne first, to discuss the role. Applications are made via an online form. There is then an interview with Mary and a member of one of the Communities. If it feels as though there is a fit, both to L'Arche and to a particular community, then further paperwork is completed, including PVG/DBS and reference checks.

There is no hard deadline for applications; however, the earlier the application, the more likely the particular needs/desires of the applicant can be met, so contact with Mary or an application is encouraged sooner rather than later. This pilot will be reviewed in the spring and may or may not run again next year.


