Letter from Thie Dy Vea

Dear friends,

Well, I've been here on the Isle of Man for three weeks! It should by now have been four weeks but, as many of you will know, my first attempt at getting here failed. My daughter had kindly offered to accompany me and share the driving so that I would have access to my car from the start. All went well until we were three minutes from the Sea Terminal at Heysham where the car broke down. We sat there while the boat sailed! The next day's ferry was cancelled due to technical problems so it was a week later, having taken the short flight from Edinburgh, that I finally set foot on Manx soil!

So much has happened since then that it feels like I've been here months. I now have a Manx-registered car, I'm registered with Manx Care (the equivalent of our NHS), and I'm waiting to hear from the government as to whether they consider me to be resident here for tax purposes.

I am adjusting to a different way of life. The retreat house is situated on the A1 which sounds familiar - but here the resemblance ends. It's a single-carriageway road, which winds its way through villages and countryside but is the main commuter route for people working in Douglas. People are often in a hurry, so I have to keep my wits about me.

Life is busy in Thie Dy Vea (House of Life). Since I have been here we have hosted a couple of quiet days, a weekly Lent Course, a weekly art course and a weekend residential retreat, run and catered for by members of the team. This week we are offering

hospitality to a bishop and a representative of The Leprosy Mission, who are both working here on the island. My main responsibilities this week will be helping in the preparation of the guest rooms and serving breakfasts. Last week I was busy with preparing material for the retreat so, as you can see, no two weeks are the same.

One of the joys for me is the fact that, at the start of each day, we gather as a team for morning prayer (Northumbrian Community version) and at noon on Friday, however busy we might be, we pause for Holy Communion (Iona Community version.)

By necessity my hours are flexible. I am learning how to pace myself and take sufficient time off, which is a new experience for me, having spent most of my working life as a teacher being ruled by the bell. However, I'm looking forward to Saturday when I'll be out walking with old friends in the south of the island.

I think often of my friends at St Anne's and hold you in my prayers. For now I'll just say 'Moghrey Mie' and good bye.

Introduction to the New Testament Epistles

The First Epistle of Paul to the Thessalonians

Paul wrote his first epistle to the Thessalonians from Corinth. Researchers are almost unanimously agreed on Paul's authorship. His known characteristics are apparent in the letter. Historical allusions in the book fit Paul's life as recounted in Acts. 1 Thessalonians is usually dated around 50AD (with Galatians and the epistle of James among the first of the New Testament books to have been written).

Thessalonica was a bustling seaport city and an important communications and trade centre, with good road links especially north to the Danube. It was the largest city in Macedonia and an important geographical hub.

Paul had left Thessalonica after a brief stay there. Recent converts from paganism had been left with little external support in a time of persecution. Aware of this, Paul's purpose in writing the letter was to encourage the new converts in their various trials, to give advice about Christian living, and to give assurance concerning life after death for believers who die before the anticipated return of Christ.

Although the content of the letter is quite wide-ranging, the subject of eschatology (the doctrine of "last things") is predominant in both Thessalonian letters. Every chapter of 1 Thessalonians ends with a reference to the Second Coming of Christ, with chapter 4 giving it major consideration. The Second



Coming therefore permeates the letter and is basically its overall theme. In fact the two letters are often designated "the eschatological letters" of Paul.




